

Explanation of Living Trusts

There are <u>4</u> basic parties to a trust:

- 1. Grantor the person who creates the trust and puts their assets of their choosing into the trust (which is called funding).
- **2. Trustee** the person who manages the trust.
- 3. Lifetime Beneficiaries those who the Trustees may give assets to and from the trust during the Grantor's lifetimes.
- **4. Final Beneficiaries** those who will receive the final disbursements from the trust once the grantor passes away.

There are $\underline{2}$ types of living trusts:

- 1. Revocable Living Trust A revocable living trust allows you, as the grantor, to set YOUR own rules. You lay out everything in the trust, just as you would in your will. However, once you pass away, everything that is in your trust does not have to go through probate.
- 2. Irrevocable Living Trust An irrevocable living trust allows you to set your own rules and avoid probate, but it also allows you to PROTECT your assets in your trust during your lifetime. This means that if you get into a lawsuit, you cannot lose what you have in your

trust. This also means that you can protect all of your assets in your trust from the nursing home and Medicaid.

*** <u>Most common</u>

Also with this type of trust, you, as the grantor, cannot be the lifetime principal beneficiary. This means that if you want to take out exactly what you put into your trust, you will have to go through a person you trust (such as a loved one) who can be your principal beneficiary. This allows your stuff to be protected!

Estate Administration

estate plannina attorneys, a large focus of our practice is helpina clients avoid the probate process upon their passing. The benefits of doing so include keeping the administration private, lessening administrative costs, and moving the process along without timelines imposed by the Court.

When it comes to administering assets held in a trust, it is a much smoother process; however, there are still pitfalls that trustees come across when settling a trust estate.

The trust itself provides specific rules to the trustees to help with the administration. In addition to the rules imposed by the trust, there are also state specific rules to be followed. In Ohio, we follow the Ohio Trust Code controlled by Chapter 5801 of the Ohio Revised Code. provides more in depth instructions regarding trust administration, including specific notices and accountings that Trustees must provide to the beneficiaries by law.

Often, trustees feel as though they can follow the rules of the trust on their own, but without guidance of an attorney they may be missing some very important steps. This could subject the trustees to civil liability if any of their actions result in an adverse impact to the beneficiaries of the trust. The best way to avoid any of these potential consequences is to work a trusted estate planning or elder law attorney to help walk you through the process and ensure the trustees are acting in an efficient and appropriate manner.
